Athletics

WHAT A WONDERFUL YEAR for Boys High athletics in this our centenary year! With superb leadership from Gavin Matthey, our team steadily improved, beating King Edward VII School at the annual meeting between our two schools for the first time in 30 years. We realised our full potential by winning the 'A' Inter-High at LC de Villiers Stadium, a dream we have been pursuing for the last 8 years. The win inspired and motivated both coaches and athletes, and saw many boys competing on their own at Pilditch in the third and fourth terms in the Gauteng-North season.

Boys High also competed only for the second time in the prestigious Technikon Top Twelve competition in the fourth term, where our top 12 athletes, based on points on the ABSA tables, competed against 38 other teams, including Pretoria's top athletics schools. This year we did exceptionally well, earning 3rd place. We have since had invitations from schools to compete in the first term, as well as an invitation to the Engen Top 20 Competition in Bloemfontein in February.

The number of Honours and Full Colour awards earned this year bear testimony to the perseverance and commitment of our athletes to strive for excellence. Adding to the

success of the season, 21 new records were set this year, and 2 were equalled. A few which need special mention are:

- the U16 400m School and Track record held by E. Labuschagne since 1973 was broken by John Mouton;
- the U16 100m, School and Track record held by R. Williams since 1986 was broken by Dean Winterton;
- the U17 Discus, Track record held by A. Flint (Parktown) since 1993 was broken by Wynand Coetzee;

- the U17 200m, Track record held by W. Storey (KES) since 1995 was broken by Neil Schutte;

- the U17 100m Hurdles, School record held by F. Potgieter since 1995 was broken by Warren Gabryk

We would like to thank the staff and outside coaches for their dedication to athletics, and the athletes for their consistently hard work to make this season one of the best ever.

A special word of thanks goes to the Matric athletes who unstintingly gave of their best the entire season – they did the school proud.

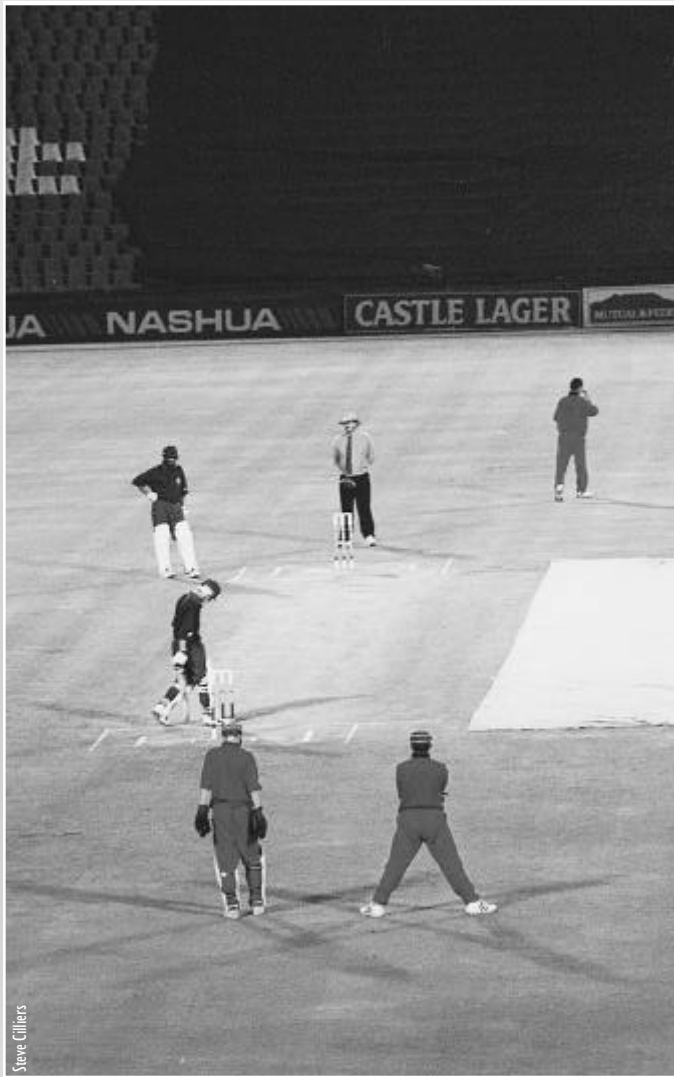
